Summer School Is Cool, It's Fun, We Like It!

For three whirlwind weeks from June 28 through July 17, Caroline House hummed with more than 30 elementary and middle school students. The youngest camper was a pre-kindergartener, Giovanni. Most children were from local public elementary schools in Bridgeport. Many kids, like Steven, a hip eight grader who returned to study with his friend and mentor Lucas, were comfortable old-timers. Romeo was an ultra-cool but occasionally uncertain 6th grader who arrived in the United States from Jamaica just last November.

On the first day of camp Bill Finch, the Mayor of Bridgeport, paid Caroline House a surprise visit. A thicket of hands shot up when he asked star-struck students how many countries they represented. "In America we are all equal, I get one vote, you get one vote," he informed them in a quick civics lesson.

The camp that ran from 9 am until noon everyday quickly fell into a regular routine. Students rotated between journaling, English and math. In the journaling room, Marie-

Paule encouraged students to express emotion in words, pastels and watercolors, and ultimately edited an impressive Caroline House Summer Journal comprised of the students' thoughtful work. Children were encouraged to read and then take home literature generously donated by First Books. They studied phonics on brand new laptops. Often, they pulled out word and strategy games. Spy Alley was a favorite. Sleeping Queens was a big hit with the smaller girls. At recess, the backyard of Caroline House was a blur of jump ropes and soccer balls.

Of the young adults who gave up many hours of their summer to help at Caroline House, some preferred to help in a particular subject, while others grew attached to a particular student. They learned or were reminded of the tremendously satisfying light in a young child's eyes when he or she finally understands something a teacher is trying to impart. Anna mentioned she is now thinking about a teaching career after she graduates. When little Luis was asked to make up a sentence using the word "dream," he stopped wiggling for a nanosecond and wrote: "Every night I dream of my tutor." These tutors, mostly high school and college-aged volunteers, deserve acknowledgement for the program's success and are grateful for the enrichment they received from the kids.

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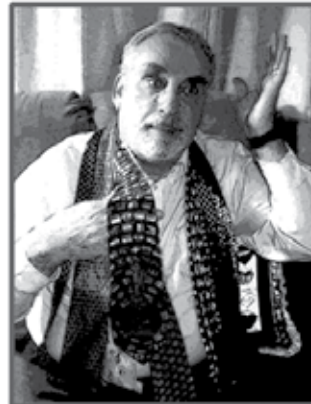
Greetings from the Executive Director, S. Ann Moles, SSND
